

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. 1 Thessalonians 5: 16-18

We are a Good Friday people – who face death and the grave – who have an Easter promise – that not even death has the last word!

These six weeks in Job have been so enlightening for me, and I hope for you who have attended each week. To experience this story in the context of our Christian hope, is to know the pain of Job's trials with the nail-pierced hands of Jesus supporting us!

We move this month into a six week study of the Lord's Prayer. For some of you it will be a refresher course from Confirmation days. For all of us, it will be an in-depth look at the prayer Jesus gave his disciples when they asked him to teach them to pray. We will be using Luke's version of the prayer as we dig

into this rich prayer that we pray each week in worship (and I wonder how automatically?)!

I have been asked by our Bishop to become part of the Multi-Synodical Candidacy Committee which is something I have wanted to be a part of since I became ordained. I have a two-day meeting at the Synod Office at the beginning of this month. Then, at long last, the staff will be back together in the office as we begin our final summer push and complete preparation for fall programming.

There are books to read and schedules to prepare and, of course, a search for our new Director of Worship and Music. We will keep you posted as we move forward with this search.

We are very grateful for Carole and Tom Parmeter Dyer and their talents as they serve as Interim Directors of Worship and Music. It is such a gift to have them as members of our congregation. And, how wonderful it is to have Roger Halvorson and Nathan Latiolait as members and contributors to our worship experience!

We are blessed as a congregation with amazing musicians, singers, readers, ushers, assisting ministers, greeters, media tech, and altar guild members who make each Sunday morning experience such a smooth-running event filled with God's love.

### **Getting to know our Interim Music Directors**

CHICAGO – The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has released a statement in response to the shootings in Baton Rouge, La., and Dallas that killed eight police officers.

Eaton's statement follows:

My soul is bereft of peace: I have forgotten what happiness is. (Lamentations 3:17)

Too often in the past months we have been stunned by violence. Last Sunday in Baton Rouge, La., and earlier this month in Dallas, police were the target. Many in our congregations serve in law enforcement. These are our brothers and sisters, children of God who dedicate their lives to keeping our communities safe, who risk their lives for strangers. Acts of violence, at home and abroad, are all too frequent. Each is evidence of a broken world. Lutherans understand this and believe that the state has the authority and obligation to protect its citizens. Good government and peace are among the things we ask for when we pray "Give us today our daily bread."

Not all citizens have the same experience with law enforcement. We are working on that as a nation and a church. But the targeting and assassination of police officers is a threat to all of us. Nothing is solved by this violence.

Working in law enforcement is an honorable way to live one's baptismal vocation. Many of us know police who are members of our congregations. They serve with dedication to the common good even at the risk of their lives. Police and other first responders see the best and the worst of human nature, and they do that on your behalf and mine. Officers killed in the line of duty leave behind families, comrades and friends. We continue to hold those who mourn in our prayers. But a little bit of us has died too.

"If one member suffers, all suffer together" (I Corinthians 12:26).

Although broken, our world is also a redeemed one. God's answer to hatred and violence is the love and life revealed in the death and resurrection of Jesus. In Christ, God reconciles the world to God's self. We are called to that ministry of healing and reconciliation in our hearts, in our homes and in our communities. God is ever faithful. We are held as one people in God's love and that love will never let us go.

But this I call to mind, and therefore have hope: The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning ...

(Lamentations 3:21-23)
