Happy New Year! As we begin 2020, I would like to invite you to celebrate a few moments on New Year's Eve in a different way by lighting 7 candles – they can be any random candles you have at your house – or perhaps a special set of 7 that you would use each year from now on at your home. It's a simple litany, beautiful and hopefully meaningful. I've adapted it from *Shine on, Star of Bethlehem*, which was compiled by Geoffrey Duncan.

Light the first candle. We(I) light this candle remembering the children who were baptized this past year. It beams that all children may be able to grow up receiving affection and protection. Thus says God: *Fear not for I have redeemed you, I have called you by your name, you are mine. Isaiah 43:1*

Light the second candle. We (I) light this candle bearing in mind all those who have celebrated wedding anniversaries this year; those who are newly married, and those who have celebrated silver and golden jubilees. *God is love and he who abides in love abides in God and God abides in them.* I John 4:16

Light the third candle. We (I) light this candle remembering all those who have passed away this year, all for whom we (I) have mourned and we continue to mourn. It illuminates their final way to the eternal home. *If we live for the Lord. If we die we die for the Lord. But, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord.* Romans 14:8

Light the fourth candle. We (I) light this light commemorating all the people, near or far, who had to live under wars and have suffered violence and anxiety. What they have suffered and endured, need your nearness, your comfort and your hope: *And lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age.* Matthew 28:20

Light the fifth candle. We (I) light this candle recollecting all the marvelous things we have experienced in the past year. For greater and smaller moments. This light beams, in order that we (I) continue to enjoy the fortunes, the happiness and everything else that we (I) have received as a gift from the one who comforts us saying: *Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice.* Philippians 4:4

Light the sixth candle. We(I) light this candle mindful of the people who have committed themselves, very much, even put their lives at risk, for the sake of maintaining freedom and reconciliation and for facilitating living and working together without giving way to violence and hatred. It burns for those who have not lost hope even in the midst of experiences of powerlessness and suffering. *For certainly I know the plans I have for you, plans for welfare and not for evil and I give you a future and a hope.* Jeremiah 29:11.

Light the seventh candle. We (I) light this seventh candle with everyone in mind, bearing each other in our (my) strengths and weaknesses, anxieties and hopes. This candle reminds us (me)of the ways we(I) have gladly gone through, and reminds us (me)of the paths where we(I) didn't want to go. May it continue to shine for each and every one of us in the coming year so that we will be able to say: *Commend your ways to the Lord and hope in him, he will make them good.* Psalm 37:5

There are so many wonderful things in store for our congregation this year. I pray these few minutes of prayerful, light-filled contemplation will set our feet firmly in the path that God intends for each of us in 2020.

Enjoy a Safe Holiday Season

Holiday safety is an issue that burns brightest from late November to mid-January, when families gather, parties are scheduled and travel spikes. Take some basic precautions to ensure your family remains safe and injury-free throughout the season.

12 Ways to Stay Safe:

1. Drive Safely

Prepare your car for winter and keep an emergency preparedness kit with you.

2. Light Safely

Turn off all lights and decorations when you go to bed or leave the house.

3. Plant Safely

Keep potentially poisonous plants – mistletoe, holly berries, Jerusalem cherry and amaryllis – away from children and pets.

4. Burn Safely

Place candles where they cannot be knocked down or blown over, and out of reach of children and pets.

5. Keep Trees Safely

Make sure your tree has a stable platform and keep it away from heat sources.

6. Cook Safely

Use a food thermometer to make sure meat is cooked to a safe temperature.

7. Store Food Safely

Refrigerate hot or cold leftover food within two hours of being served.

8. Fry Turkeys Safely

The National Safety Council discourages the use of turkey fryers at home and urges those who prefer fried turkey to seek out professional establishments or consider using an oilless turkey fryer.

9. Give Safely

Be cautious about toys that have button batteries or magnets, which can be harmful or fatal if swallowed. For children under 10, avoid toys that must be plugged into an electrical outlet.

10. Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Carbon monoxide detectors save lives. Every year, over 400 people die and 50,000 are treated for carbon monoxide poisoning.

11. Avoid Injuries While Enjoying the Winter Weather

Whether you are skiing, snowboarding, sledding or skating, take safety precautions like learning basic skills and using the appropriate gear for the sport.

12. Get Your Flu Shot

Doctors recommended everyone 6 months and older gets vaccinated against the flu.
