This is Church. Welcome Home! Seeing 2020 Vision What are we doing and why are we doing it?

Does the term "Capital Campaign" make you want to take a break from church until the whole thing blows over? If so, you're not alone. However, the reality is that it takes funding to do ministry. Since churches gave up selling indulgences several centuries ago, this funding generally comes in the form of gifts to the church. Of course the church needs funding to carry out the ministries of teaching, reaching out to others, gathering folks together for worship and reaching beyond the church to serve.

However, the most compelling reason for conducting a capital campaign is to assist people in their personal faith and financial walk. You see, the two are linked together. How we manage our finances is influenced by what we believe and our values. Our values are directly impacted by where we choose to send the thousands and thousands of dollars that pass through our hands over the course of our lives.

As a congregation stretches itself to reach a large, challenging goal such as retiring a debt, expanding facilities, or upgrading existing facilities, people also begin to talk about the past, present and future ministries of the congregation. How will this project be a blessing to us? How will we be a greater blessing to others as a result of doing this project? As we dream and discuss we start to sense a growing sense of hope and eagerness to "get after it."

The experience of working together as a congregation to achieve a large goal helps build up our confidence and increases our faith that God really is providing for what need day by day, dollar by dollar, and step by step.

So to answer the questions in the headline:

What are we doing?	We're boldly stepping out in faith through a Capital Campaign that starts in March 1 and concludes in April 5 (though gifts pledged will be received for three years). You'll learn a lot more about this on February 23 at worship.
Why are we doing this?	We're doing this to implement a series of enhancements and improvements to our campus. As the caretakers of God's house, we are responsible to ensure the long-term integrity of Christ Lutheran, our church home. This will help our people trust at a very deep level that God is still in charge. Economic situations go up and down like a yo-yo. Some years we have plenty; some years we barely scrape by. Every year God provides. We will start where we are, we will share what we have, and we will trust that God will take what we are able to do and do miraculous things with our combined efforts.
Why else are we doing this?	We've been discussing some exciting goals. The beautification and enhancements to our sanctuary will provide a worshipful environment for all who attend. A Capital Campaign is the tool we've chosen to accomplish all this.
