What is a Synod?

Synods unite the work of congregations within their areas, serve as regional support, and guide pastoral and other staff candidates. In order to strengthen the relationship between synod leaders and the churchwide office, many churchwide teams relate to and support the work of the synods.



The Southwest California Synod is a <u>Reconciling In Christ Synod</u>, making a public commitment to welcome, include and celebrate lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, and asexual (LGBTQIA+) people.



We are also a <u>Lutheran Restoring Creation Synod</u>. Lutherans Restoring Creation is a grassroots movement

promoting care for creation in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, cultivating a community of dedicated stewards of earth and neighbor who proclaim God's promise of hope and healing for all.

QR Codes, or quick response codes, have become a popular and tech savvy way for businesses to perform contactless payments or provide a direct link to their website. According to the FBI, cybercriminals are taking advantage of this technology by directing QR code scans to malicious sites to steal victim's data, embedding malware to gain access to the victim's device, or redirecting payments to fraudulent accounts.

Here are 8 ways from the FBI to spot and avoid malicious QR codes:

- 1. Check the URL that you are being directed to after scanning the QR code. Look out for malicious domain names that may be similar to the intended URL but with typos or a misplaced letter and authentic-looking phishing sites.
- 2. Practice caution when entering login, personal, or financial information to a website that was navigated to from a QR code.
- 3. Check physical QR codes for tampering. This can be done by ensuring that no sticker has been placed on top of the original code.
- 4. Avoid downloading apps from a QR code. The FBI recommends using the mobile device's app store for a safer download.
- 5. Avoid making online payments via QR codes sent in emails stating there was a payment failure for a recently made purchase. Calling the company for verification at a phone number published on a trusted site is highly recommended.
- 6. Avoid downloading QR code scanner apps as it increases the risk of downloading malware onto the device. Instead, use a phone's built-in scanner through the camera app of most smartphones.
- 7. Before making payments using QR codes for someone you know, contact them through a trusted phone number or contact method to verify that the code is from them.
- 8. Avoid making payments through a site navigated to from a QR code. Instead, manually enter a known and trusted URL to complete the payment.
