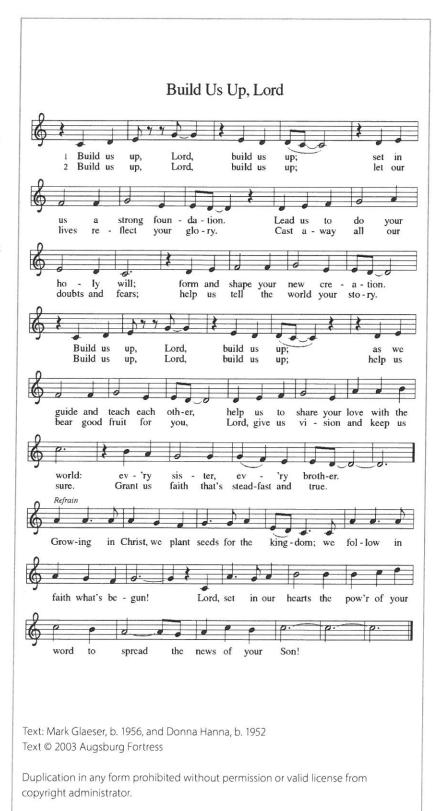

In the early verses of Ephesians 4, the apostle Paul writes to the Christians in Ephesus, a city on the Aegean Sea at the mouth of a river and at the intersection of three trading routes. The letter was written about ten years after the church had started. During the early years of this congregation, Jews and Gentiles from several ethnicities and nationalities had come together to form "one body." Paul was aware that they had done well and commended them for their faith and love.

The word "one" appears more than seven times in the first four verses. This reflects the importance Paul gave to being called into the "unity of Christ." He wanted to note that, although many of the church members came from far off, there is "one Lord, one faith, one baptism." This oneness reflects God's gift of reconciliation in Christ.

A second emphasis from Paul was that, as believers, they were to "bear with one another in love." This would require humility, gentleness and patience as each of them practiced their faith. It would require tolerance to "maintain unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

A third emphasis was that each person had been given gifts by God and that these gifts were given to increase the whole. Because the Ephesian church was a young congregation and its members were just beginning in their faith journey, their understandings were often tossed to and fro. But as they grew in faith, each person contributed to building up the body of Christ.

The fourth and final emphasis was that by "speaking the truth in love," each person must grow into Christ. This means taking time to learn about one another and their gifts. Knowing these gifts, we can do God's work both within and beyond the faith community. When there are decisions to make or relationships to reconcile, we know to begin with prayer and reflection, always desiring to speak the truth in love — not for our own benefit but for God's glory, that we might become more complete.

As our members and friends gather today, whether face-to-face or online, we are reminded of our calling into "unity in Christ." We come from many places and work in many contexts, and yet we recognize "one Lord, one faith, one baptism."

Whether new to a worshiping community or further along the journey, we realize that humility, gentleness and patience are required both in the good times and especially in times of uncertainty and struggle. God wants us to be more complete through our work. Christ provides the way. The Holy Spirit is with us for guidance and courage. Each of us has been given the gifts to be complete, and through our faithfulness we will grow stronger and work together as one body.

LET US PRAY: LORD, LET THE WORDS OF THE APOSTLE PAUL DWELL IN US DEEPLY. MAY WE EMBRACE THE RECONCILING POWER OF ONENESS WITH CHRIST. MAY THIS ONENESS GUIDE OUR CONGREGATION AS WE LIVE INTO THE NEW REALITIES OF THESE TIMES. AS WE MEET NEW PARTNERS IN MINISTRY, MAY WE TAKE TIME TO GET TO KNOW THEM WITH PATIENCE, HUMILITY AND LOVE. HELP US TO SEE HOW SHARING OUR GIFTS WILL MAKE YOUR WORK EASIER AND MORE FULFILLING WHILE BRINGING ALL OF US CLOSER TO CHRIST. Christ Lutheran Church Congregational Meeting: January 19, 2020

Attendance: 44 members attended. Our quorum is 27 members. See attached sign-in sheet.

Meeting called to order at 11:09 AM by President Greg Koch Pastor Pam Challis opened in prayer.

Minutes from the September 2019 Congregational meeting were presented and approved. Pastor Pam Challis made the motion to accept and file the minutes. Gary Burkard seconded. Passed unanimously. Minutes filed.

Financial Report: Report filed. D. Challis reported Income showed \$800 below in envelope giving but that \$11,750 was collected above budget. General expenses were under spent by \$14,712. We are \$26, 471.08 in the black. PRE is in the red by \$55,662.69 due to major repairs that are a part of the 10 Year Plan. We are sharing the cost of the upgrades to the phone system with the preschool.

Committee Reports: Year end ministry reports are found in the 2018 Annual Report of the Congregation

Church In Society: Ruth Benner shared an update on Habitat For Humanity. We have donated more than we pledged in our 5-year commitment. This is the 30th year anniversary of the LB Coalition. There is 48 house build planned for the next 2 years. Names of each of the ministries we support and the CLC contact person is listed in the annual report. We are in need of a new coordinator for the COA dinners.

Outreach: Lisa Cottrell reported that she is looking to put together a committee. She would like to put together a welcome packet for visitors. Small groups have been successful and will continue in the future. We need to consider how we are church in our community.

Stewardship: Doug Holdhusen reported that we now have a twitter account that we are working on getting an Instagram. He thanked the congregation for their generosity in the resent stewardship campaign. We were reminded the the upcoming capital campaign is a part of "This is Church".

Pastors Report: Pastor Pam Challis reviewed the year in a power point presentation. Our solar system is saving us approx. \$1100 per month. Our 10 Year Plan repairs completed this year include: fiber optic lines, a new phone system, updated computers, a new roof, solar panel system, LED lights, new HVAC, and repairs of our hazardous electrical issues. She thanked the congregation for their generosity and all of the many ways we serve our community and our world. The motion was made by Rebecca Green to accept and file all ministry reports, seconded by Kristi Eaglehorse. Passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS: Greg Koch gave an update on the solar system. It was at full capacity on November 1, 2019. We are saving approx. \$1100 a month on our electric bill.

NEW BUSINESS: Dave Challis presented the 2020 proposed budget. Income has dropped from the previous year. The Connection is no longer renting space from us. Expenses have increased. We looked at the benevolence distribution of funds. Church and Home has remained relatively the same. This budget is realistic and conservative on expenses. The mortgage remains the same. There is a 3%b pay increase for staff and a \$1000 increase in the pastor's car line item. Workman's comp laws have changed so we have more employees to cover who are no longer considered 1098 consultants. We are in the red by \$47,523. This number was approx. \$30,000 in 2019. Typically, we underspend by the end of the year. We have 80 giving units. If each unit gave \$10 extra dollars a week we could make up this deficit. We do have funds we could borrow from but this is not the prudent thing to do. We have restricted funds to use for a youth director. The plan is to resume the hiring process in the Spring. Currently there is more than \$17,000 budgeted for this position. Out reach is the new name for the Evangelism committee. The line item for this committee is still labeled as Evangelism. It was suggested that we change this line item to Outreach to match the committee it goes with. Kristi Eaglehorse made a motion that we accept the proposed 2020 budget as our working budget, Doug Holdhausen seconded. Discussion held. Passed unanimously.

Greg Koch gave an update on the 10 Year Plan committee and the sanctuary upgrade plan. We have a detailed plan for repairs and maintenance over the next 10 years. Members of the 10 Year Planning committee were introduced. Andy Trost will be the chair. They have had 2 meetings so far. The capital campaign will kick-off on March 1, 2020. All will be sent information via email and in the February newsletter. 5 families will be hosting small group meetings as part of the campaign. Several of the very large projects in the 10 Year Plan have already been completed this past year. Pastor Pam Challis is the contact point for questions and concerns in regard to the 10-year plan and the capital campaign. Cynthia Mavis will be meeting with the 10 Year Planning committee to share her initial ideas for the upgrade to the sanctuary.

The 2020 council was introduced. Out going chairs were thanked. Phil Peterson made the motion to accept this new slate of council members, Kirk Wiesel seconded. Passed unanimously. The audit committee is in need of members. We are looking for someone to chair the youth committee.

Our average Sunday morning attendance is approx. 80 people a Sunday. We need 125 people attending per Sunday to consider 2 services. We have lost many of our faithful members this year due to deaths and moving out of the area. On average each member attends once every 6 weeks.

We need 2 members to attend the Synod Assembly at the end of May. Greg Koch was thanked for his service as Congregation President.

Pastor Pam Challis closed in prayer.

President Greg Koch adjourned the meeting at 12:32 PM Next meeting to be held in June 2020, time and date TBA

Christ Lutheran Congregational Meeting Minutes

September 20, 2020

52 members in attendance: see sign in sheet.

Meeting called to order at 12:38 by A. Elliott (This meeting was a virtual meeting due to Social Isolating due to the COVID-19 pandemic)

P. Challis opened in prayer.

January 2020 minutes were not reviewed due to not being printed for all to review. This will be postponed until the January 2021 congregational meeting.

Financial Report: Report filed. D. Challis shared the Bottom-Line Financial report. We are doing okay. The lows and highs are balancing out. We are in the red by \$5500 in income. PRE has more income and fewer expenses but still in the red by \$6,630. Overall, expenses are less than budgeted by \$33,663. We are above budget by \$45,794, which does not include the PPP loan of \$48,600. We will have some facilities income soon from Namaste Congregation renting space from us, K. Randig shared that we are under run in our mortgage due to paying only 5 of 8 payments. There will be a balloon payment in the future. This balloon payment will come due at the end of the loan, in approx. 15 years. We plan to refinance this loan. Custodial services were reduced when the campus was closed. We currently have no expenditures on the youth position or for part-time musicians. The PPP loan was secured through Farmers and Merchants Bank. Hopefully we will be forgiven the entire amount due to that amount being under \$100,000. We are waiting on Congress to rule on this. We have until July 2021 to rectify the PPP loan. We have spent everything we can using this loan amount. Our Edison bill was \$800 last year for May, this year \$218. Last year for June, \$1201, this year \$312. Last year for July, \$1640, this year \$327. For August last year, \$1290, this year \$600. This is an approx. savings of \$4628. Kathy Westwood made a motion to accept and file the financial report. Doug Holdhusen seconded. The vote was unanimous.

Pastors Report: P. Challis reported that the preschool play yard barn was broken into by the homeless who are living behind the cell tower at the far end of our parking lot. All were aske to drive slowly through the parking lot if they happen to be passing by the church. If you see something suspicious or out of the ordinary, to call LBPD, NOT 91. The LBPD dispatch phone number was given out to all. COVID-19 will not allow for the homeless to be relocated. Additional security is too expensive and ineffective. Both the Preschool and Council have not chosen to go this route. Starting September 26, 2020 Namaste, a new age congregation grounded in Christianity and Eastern spiritual philosophies, lead by Rev Bobbie Becker, will be renting space from us. They will be using room 8, upstairs, as office space. They will have a 1-year lease with rent being \$2200 per month. The lease will renew until we say no, or they choose to no longer rent space. A new bible study is starting. It will be based on the book Inspired by R. Holdevens. This bible book study will be scheduled for either Monday or Tuesday evenings at 7 pm. The plan is to start at the end of September. The book can be downloaded.

Old Business: We will delay the Capital Campaign until we are back in person. This was a unanimous decision made by the Church Council at the September 2020 meeting. The 10 Year Plan repairs continue. The water main connection was replaced, a \$400 expenditure. The City of Long Beach put in a new water meter. The campus will be rekeyed due to a set of keys being stolen, We have not rekeyed the property in over 30 years. There are many unaccounted for keys. The locks will be rekeyed, and some tumblers will be replaced. We have \$4081.80 in restricted Key fund line item. This will cover most of the cost of the rekeying. We have accepted a bid of \$5565 for this. All with a key that a key deposit was made toward, please see K. Croes to get your deposit back. New keys will be distributed as needed. A. Trost shared an update on the Capital Campaign. Phyllis has been notified that we have put the campaign on hold for the time being. We will update her on our plans and the reset of the campaign.

New Business: D. Holdhusen shared the need for a new Stewardship Chair. PayPal is a good tool that is bringing in donations from members and folks we do not even know but are connecting with us through our streaming worship services. The theme for this year's stewardship drive is AGAPE. Materials will be sent to the membership via USPS. Temple Talks begin on Sunday, October 4, 2020. A request for additional volunteers to give a temple talk was shared. These will be recorded ahead of time and streamed during the virtual services. Each week we will feature a scripture to be a motivator and a sub-theme.

We need to nominate a new President Elect, Secretary, Stewardship Chair, Church In Society Chair, and a Youth Chair. Anyone interested in volunteering to serve in this capacity should submit their name to Deb Albrecht.

P. Challis closed in prayer.

Meeting adjourned at 1:27 pm.

Next meeting is scheduled for Sunday, January 17, 2021 at 1 PM.

Once again, I will preface this report with the following: I feel it is a joy and privilege to serve on the staff of Christ Lutheran Church, Long Beach. It has been a pleasure to work with my fellow staff and peers, volunteer musicians, pre-school children and their staff, and wonderful congregation.

The Year in Review

It was business as usual the first two and a half months of 2020. When the pandemic hit, the Music team: praise band, choir, and handbells were already into Lent and working on music for Holy Week. The Youth Music Program was on break since their concert in December; in hindsight, if I knew I would only have a few months left with these wonderful young musicians I would not of taken a break. They just went 10 months straight (including summer) and needed the time off. They were to start back up after Easter; of course, that never happened.

When the pandemic hit, we immediately went to virtual worship. After Easter, we upgraded our internet, audio and video equipment to enhance our live-stream experience. With Pastor Pam, Dave, and Roger there each week, it has been a blessing—and has kept our audio/video problems to a minimum (most problems occurred within the first few months as we were learning on the fly).

When it became apparent things were not going to get better and we were not going to re-open, others have stepped up to provide special music—thanks to Claudia and her array of string ensemble combinations—and video/in-person scripture readings. This Fall, things have gone smoothly and we do hope that everyone is now comfortable with our weekly worship format. Since March, we continue to provide online worship each week, online chapel for the preschoolers, and drive-through Communion (Thanks Pastor Pam!).

We never got back together as a congregation at Christmas like we originally hoped; it was wonderful to see everyone at our virtual Candlelight Zoom Service. I really appreciate our staff, volunteers, and peers for helping me provide the best virtual music experience we can offer with our limited resources...especially at Easter and Christmas. Thank you!

The one bright spot was the purchasing of the equipment and materials needed to be successful in this current situation. With my classes at CSUDH going virtual, I had to upgrade everything at home making the necessary purchases at church redundant and unnecessary...saving us over \$3000. With the church spending the monies needed to upgrade our internet and purchasing a second camera system (and cables, video card, adapters, access. et al), I was able to cover the rest: new imac computer, another camera system with everything, all the video software, and all the updated audio equipment needed for now.

Final Thoughts

In 2019, we were successful in adding special concerts to help draw attention to our wonderful church: 1) the classical guitar, flute, and soprano trio recital in April; 2) the Bell Concert in June; 3) the Southern California Classical Guitar Society Workshop Concert in July; 4) the Youth Music Concert in December; and 5) our annual Christmas Concert.

In 2020, we were successful in drawing attention to our church in another way: live-streaming. There are people watching us online each week all around the world...sometimes up to 200+ people. We will permanently install live-streaming as a weekly option even after we are all together again.

In 2021, hopefully when it is safe and we are back together again in weekly worship we will plan a huge music celebration/concert. I can't wait!

As for my music team, staff, and volunteers: I am so blessed to have such talented and dedicated musicians on my music team. I appreciate the time, talents, and dedication they give on a weekly basis. Thank you!!!

In closing, the pandemic may of de-railed my plans for Christ Lutheran in 2020 but my yearly goals will never change. As I say every year, I state the following for now and when we are all together again:

As I continue my life-long spiritual journey, I will continue to strive for the following: that I will continue to value quality over quantity using all the groups at my disposal to generate music each week at worship; I will continue to improve the quality of worship each Sunday; I will continue to improve my technical, musical, administrative, teaching, and directing skills so I can provide growth and leadership; and I will continue to show my love and dedication to Christ Lutheran. Thank you once again for this opportunity.

2020 CLP Annual Report

The 2019/2020 school year was a year like no other! We started our year off in January like any other year with our Special Person Day event and prepping for our Annual Auction Fundraiser. Our "Boots & Bling...It's a Country Thing" auction was scheduled to be on Friday, March 13th. Everything was packed up and ready to go and then our world changed. The day of the event, with great sadness, we had to cancel our event and close the school temporarily as we navigated what the Coronavirus would mean for us.

We were able to secure a PPP loan to help us continue to pay our staff during the closure without having to continue to charge parents tuition. Our staff implemented a "distance learning" curriculum and did periodic Zoom calls with their students to stay connected. After a tremendous amount of work, planning and completely re-thinking how preschool works, we were able to reopen the Preschool on June 15th with all of our new protocols in place. We reopened at a slightly lower capacity of 45 instead of 60 to maintain small class sizes. We implemented curbside drop off and pick up to limit people coming on campus. We started doing health checks at the gate prior to admission. We shortened our operating hours from 7am-6pm to 8am-5pm in order to maintain stable groups and have the same group of children with the same teacher all day without mixing. While all of these new protocols seemed incredibly challenging, it was impressive to see how quickly everyone adapted to the new ways.

Our summer theme was "Home Sweet Home" and included weekly themes of: A whole new world, A royal invitation to the Kingdom, Stars & Stripes, Outer Space, Mountains/Nature, Countryside/Farm, Ocean Adventures, Island/Tiki Tiki Jungle, Desert, and Arctic/Eskimo life is "snow" much fun. We were not able to have special visitors, but still had plenty of fun with special activities, water days, and a 4th of July parade that the parents could watch via Zoom. In August, sadly, our playground sheds were broken into over the weekend and \$3,000 worth of equipment was stolen. We were able to catch the people that did it and had some of our things returned. We decided to do a "Color Run" fundraiser to cover the cost of replacing items that were not returned or were damaged. The children took turns running laps and getting sprayed by the different colors as the parents watched via Zoom. The children had a blast and we were able to raise enough to replace everything we needed. Since we were not able to go forward with our in-person auction, we decided to do an online auction for the items we had. We raised about \$5,000. We are so incredibly grateful for the parents and church member's generous support of our school!

Our fall session began in September with full enrollment of 60 children. We transformed the adult lounge into a temporary classroom to be able to accommodate our enrollment and still maintain small class sizes. We hired Mrs. Stiles and Ms. Chhim part time to help cover breaks. Mrs. Caston was out on medical leave so Ms. Fitzpatrick and Ms. Chhim worked more hours to help cover her class. Our classroom arrangements are completely different this year as our priority was stable groups rather than age. So we renamed our rooms after woodland creatures and shuffled teachers around so they are all single teacher classrooms with smaller class sizes. We have a sibling room and a "part-timers" room and then other rooms that are by ages. A couple weeks into the school year, we did our Back to School Night virtually via Zoom and it went really well.

In October we had another break-in into Room 2 from the door off the playground. The only thing of value stolen was an IPad. We had to close that classroom for the day to clean and sanitize. From the security cameras, we saw the person that broke in walk back to the encampment behind the cell towers and then broke in on his way back out. We have been working with the police, CHP and Caltrans to clear out the encampment, but due to COVID-19 they would not move them.

While we still did all of our special events this year, they all looked a little different. For Halloween, we could not do our usual Trunk or Treating and Harvest Fest on the yard, so the children dressed up, we did a parade for the parents to watch via Zoom and then they had individual classroom parties. For Thanksgiving, the children made placemats and centerpieces, the teachers posted videos of the children singing and saying a prayer and then enjoyed individual classroom feasts. For Christmas, a preschool parent so graciously offered to come in and film the children individually and then edit it together into a program. He did an amazing job! On the day of the scheduled Christmas Program, we sent home a bag of cookies and hot coco along with a link for everyone to watch the program "together" virtually at 6:30pm. While these are very different than what we are used to, the added benefit of doing things virtually is being able to include/share them with grandparents, Church members, people that live out of state, and other people that would not be able to experience it in person.

To say this year was challenging would be a huge understatement. However, what has been proven to me this year is that God gives us tremendous strength and has created us with the amazing ability to adapt and change. When I was learning all of the protocols to be able to re-open safely, it was if I had been tasked with reinventing the wheel and it wasn't allowed to be round. It seemed impossible. And yet, here we are almost a year later, going strong, in our new routines as if it is how we have always done things. I am incredibly grateful for our supportive families, dedicated and loyal staff, and a reliable and supportive Preschool Board.

Wishing you a very happy and blessed new year! Please continue to keep our school in your prayers as we look forward to another year of "growing in God's love at CLP".
